Walter William Crossett, Jr., 67, of French Creek, died suddenly on Sunday, November 8, 2015. He was born on July 20, 1948, in Baltimore, MD, a son of the late Walter William and Earlene Petzold Crossett.

He is survived by his beloved wife, Nancy Henshaw Crossett; two sisters: Mary Louise Hochstetler and Joyce Loretta Crossett, both of Harrisburg, PA; and numerous in-laws and beloved nieces and nephews.

Mr. Crossett was an Art Instructor in schools in Maryland, Pennsylvania, and taught for thirty years at Buckhannon-Upshur High School from January 1978-January 2008. His hobbies included working with stained glass, wood, stone, pottery, and caring for his farm and pets. He was an avid hunter and a gifted teacher.

At the request of the deceased, the body was cremated. A Celebration of Life gathering will be held at the First United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall on Saturday, December 5, 2015, from 2-4:00 PM. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be sent to Buckhannon-Upshur High School, Attn: Mary Hull, to endow a visual arts scholarship in Walt's name.

“ All four years of my high school and the summer preceding freshman year, Walt Crossett presided over all things art development in my young life. In hindsight, our art department was extremely well-funded, unusual for any high school anywhere, and all the rarer now.

In what was most certainly the art wing, people like myself could rigorously pursue skills in an expensive and amply stocked stained glass studio, a clay workshop with multiple wheels and kilns, and a fully equipped darkroom. Positively insane the aspects of the art world that were made available to us, and there was always a dedicated core of students who took everything offered, myself among them. That handful of familiar faces that wasn't just passing through and playing at something for a brief time, we were the ones who sought out the art spaces even when we weren't officially in session. Spending time there before school, during lunch, after the final bells had rung, Crossett's sphere was our refuge, something that spoke to every part of ourselves, that unnameable Solution to the unspoken Inquiry. Again, admittedly cliché; but for those of us whose passion was in every way the arts, these rooms were both the outlet and the means for honing that passion.

I've never met a more unconditionally loving man. There was never a moment when any of us were made to feel our pursuits were pointless careers in the making. Not for a second did I think he ever doubted my abilities or my will, and through this unswerving support, I never questioned it myself. He emotionally invested in us, in our messy, high school personal lives along with our art, and we wanted to make him proud. Many of those core students launched themselves into art school and excitedly raced back during that first college break to show off their portfolios, wanting his approval, knowing before we ever arrived that we already had it.

Walt Crossett handed me the high school's art scholarship personally -- another unbelievable resource, looking back once more -- at the awards ceremony executed for such things. There's a

picture of me hugging him on stage, somewhere, because he was the kind of teacher you embraced in joy. I had many art instructors after him, many far more demanding and who could probably claim more credit in hammering me into something worthy; but it always ever began with Crossett. When I think of my art education, my thoughts always go to him first, and I imagine, always will. I possess enormous admiration and respect for my college professors, but I loved Walt Crossett. We all did. He will remain that voice in my head who enthusiastically exclaims, "Absolutely! Why not?" and I will continue to endeavor to make him proud.

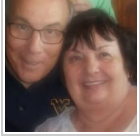
